







Today's Focus: <i>Listening Comprehension</i> Watch Miss Bailey read a short story and answer the questions she gives you at the end.</p> <p> Planning an argument text. An argument text is a text which presents points for and against a topic. An argument text can be balanced if you present the same number of for points as you do against. If it is not balanced, your argument text will try to persuade the reader either for or against your topic.</p> <p>Use the planning sheet from your Home Learning Pack to research information for an argument text which argues against the following topic: <i>The Tyrannosaurus Rex (T-Rex) was the most deadly dinosaur of the Mesozoic era.</i></p>	<p>Daily Times Tables Practise. Today's Focus: <i>Spelling</i> Practise the following spelling rule by matching the correct spelling to the correct picture.</p> <p><i>Homophones are words that sound the same but are spelt differently. It is important that you use the correct spelling in a sentence otherwise it can change the meaning entirely!</i></p> <p>Writing the title and introduction. Write a catchy title and a paragraph which introduces the argument that your text will be exploring. Think about what the sides of the argument are, what most people probably think at the moment, why this is an interesting argument and how you are argue.</p> <p>Remember: <i>You must tell the reader what side you are going to argue in your text.</i></p> <p>Challenge: <i>Use alliteration or powerful words to grab your reader's attention, eg. Down-right deadly dinos or petrifying instead of scary.</i></p>	<p>Daily Times Tables Practise. Mixed and improper fractions arise when we have more than one whole. Mixed fractions are a whole number and a left over fraction. Improper fractions are expressed as total parts above the smaller denominator.</p> <p>Watch Miss Bailey's YouTube video to explore how we can count up/down in fractions beyond one whole. Then have a go at the questions in your pack.</p>	<p>Art/DT Our focus today is: Sketching.</p> <p>One of the difficulties we have when learning to draw is that our brains try and take in lots of detailed information and recreate it all at once. This can mean that that the size or shape of our drawing gets lost and jumbled. As such, before they add the detail, artists often create rough doodles of their subject using geometric shapes to give themselves a stencil to work from.</p> <p>Today you should create a drawing of a dinosaur of your choice using this method. Subtracting fractions of the same denominator only affects the numerator.</p> <p>Watch Miss Bailey's YouTube video to recap how we do this with values that greater than one whole, then have a go at the questions in your Home Learning Pack.</p>	<p>Science If you listened to last week's reading comprehension, you will have heard there are many theories as to why the dinosaurs died out when they were the most successful creatures to have ever lived on Earth.</p> <p>One theory is that there was a significant change in climate and it became too cold for the dinosaurs to live. Normally, animals adapt over thousands of years to survive new conditions, but it may just be that the climate changed too quickly for the dinosaurs.</p> <p>As dinosaurs were reptilian creatures (scaly, cold-blooded), explore the ways similar living reptiles keep themselves warm and then design a dinosaur which could live in the modern day. What might it look like? Where might it live? Finish your argument text by writing a conclusion which summarises the points which you have made and then exaggerates that you disagree that the T-Rex was the deadliest dinosaur.</p> <p><i>Challenge: Can you use persuasive language to exaggerate your argument, eg. alliteration, similes, list of three, powerful words or superlatives (deadliest, scariest, etc).</i></p>	<p>Daily Times Tables Practise. We can add and subtract tenth and hundredth amounts expressed as fractions and decimals.</p> <p>Watch Miss Bailey's YouTube video to recap how we find decimal equivalents and explore adding/subtracting in this context.</p>	<p>History/Geography As we learnt last week, dinosaurs first lived on a giant supercontinent called Pangea which, over millions of years, split up into the continents that we know today because of something called continental drift. Because of this, we can find dinosaur fossils all over the world. However, you are more likely to find the remains of certain dinosaurs in some areas than others.</p> <p>Map different locations around the world where certain dinosaur species can be found.</p> <p>Then, compare maps of dinosaur fossils, world biomes and world rock distribution. Can you notice a pattern between environmental factors and the location of dinosaur fossils?
